Basic Fiscal Principles

<u>Balanced Budget and Fiscal Discipline</u>

- Budget must be balanced per state code
- In FY 2017-18 Budget Adoption, board set objective of structurally balanced budget
- Achieved in FY 2018-19
- FY 2021-22 Recommended Budget is balanced without anticipated year-end savings

- Hiring Freeze:
 - As directed in April Workshops, Hiring Freeze is not in effect in FY 2021-22.
- Proposition 172
 - Clarify that board may direct funding to Probation when funding for Fire Services hits 8%
- Deferred Maintenance
 - Extend the time period for funding deferred maintenance
- Other Miscellaneous Cleanups

Transient Occupancy Tax

Policy Approved April 16, 2019

Funding distributed according to approved policy

 Due to uncertainty around Tourism Industry Recovery, funding expectations remain reduced

Asset Forfeiture


 Recommended budget includes \$2.4 million of asset forfeiture being proposed by the Sheriff's Office

- Funding for:
 - Radio Replacement to comply with new standards (\$1.3 million)
 - Jail Management System Replacement Project (\$1.1 million)

Proposition 4 Limit

 Appropriations Limits adopted annually

 Set limit on total appropriations of tax revenues for state and most local governments





American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

- Provides \$96 million for Sonoma County
- Costs must be incurred by 12/31/2024
- Funding for:
 - Support public health response
 - Address negative economic impacts
 - Replace public sector revenue loss
 - Premium pay for essential workers
 - Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure



American Rescue Plan Act Proposed Process

Three areas for distribution:

Funding for COVID Response – allocated at Budget hearings

 Funding for strategic investments in County Departmental Services

Funding directly to community

American Rescue Plan Act Investments in County Departmental Services

Departments will submit proposals

August 31, 2021 Board will:

- Allocate ARPA fund to backfill revenue loss (most flexible usage)
- Hear from departments about strategic investment opportunities
- Prioritize list of department investments
 - Highest priority projects will receive more detailed analysis
- No final allocation decisions

American Rescue Plan Act Investments in County Departmental Services

Proposed criteria for evaluating departmental proposals:

- Strategic Plan alignment (including equity lens)
- ARPA eligibility
- Timing (able to be completed by deadline)
- Support for community need based on COVID-19

American Rescue Plan Act Direct Community Support

Program managed by Upstream Investments, in conjunction with Economic Development Board

 Addition of two term-limited staff to support, funded by ARPA

Will consider community and business needs

 Will be guided by resources such as census, Portrait of Sonoma, EDB studies, and other data

American Rescue Plan Act Direct Community Support

- Will leverage Upstream platform utilizing:
 - Safety Net Contracting Principles
 - Results-Based Accountability
- Funding categories based on needs assessments
- Funding categories will tie to result areas, problem indicators, and known prevention strategies
- Requests for proposals will detail intended results, proven strategies, and target population indicators

American Rescue Plan Act Direct Community Support

September 14, 2021 Board will:

- Hear update on community proposal process including:
 - More specifics on evaluation criteria
 - Report on areas of unmet community and business needs
 - Community engagement process
- No final allocation decisions


American Rescue Plan Act Final Allocations

November 2, 2021 Board will make allocation decisions:

- Allocate funding to specific departmental proposals
- Allocate funding to specific community and business needs
- Upstream will run grant program including solicitation, selection, and grant management



Boards and Commissions Update

Boards and Commissions Information

SPONSORED & FACILITATED BY SOCO

- 56 bodies/commissions
- 450 BOS appointed seats
- ~520 meetings/year (aggregate¹)
- \$0 to \$100/meeting; or \$75 to \$250/4+hr meeting

SPONSORED & FACILITATED BY EXTERNAL PARTNER AGENCY

- 20 bodies/commissions
- 143 BOS appointed seats
- ~170 meetings/year (aggregate*)
- \$50 to \$150/meeting stipend
- Some allow for mileage Reimb.
- Not financed by the County

Frequency between groups varies from 1-mtg/year to 24-mtgs/year



Boards and Commissions – Standard Stipend Options

- Assumes ~4-hr meeting
- 2,300 instances of stipend payment²

Modest

\$100/meeting (\$25/hr)

Annual Cost \$235,400 Medium

\$150/meeting (\$38/hr)

Annual Cost \$353,100 <u>High</u>

\$200/meeting (\$50/hr)

Annual Cost \$470,800

Tribal Update

Tribal Funding Update

County has impact mitigation agreements with:

- Federated Indians of the Graton Rancheria
- Dry Creek Rancheria Band of Pomo Indians
- Lytton Band of Pomo Indians

Board Inquiry Request 87 (Tab 5) lays out more details

Tribal Funding Update Graton

Board has fully allocated Guaranteed Mitigation Payments

- No payment from tribe for April-June 2020 due to closure of casino
- Reserves freed by cancellation of \$1 million in Pre-Operating repayments allow for departments to be made whole

Other Recurring Mitigation Payments

- Discretionary pots allocated
- CAO will work with relevant departments (TPW, CDC, Sonoma Water) and Tribe on proposals requiring Tribal consultation

Tribal Funding Update Graton

- In 2020 County began receiving a portion of funding flowing through Rohnert Park
 - About \$600,000 annually will be included in available sources
 - Not restricted by agreement
- Parks and Open Space Payment
 - May occur sooner than expected
 - First \$1 million + CPI may begin in FY 2021-22
 - Will work with departments and Tribe on proposed uses when money begins to come in

Tribal Funding Update Dry Creek

Amendment executed in 2021:

- No funding in 2020 or 2021 due to impacts of COVID.
- Agreement extended for 2 years

Tribe has initiated reopener and negotiations ongoing

Funding for mitigation measures continuing, supported by General Fund

Tribal Funding Update Lytton

One-time funding of \$6.1 million received in 2020

- For in-lieu development impact fees for traffic, parks, and affordable housing and costs of administration
- \$1.95 million allocated to date, mainly for parks and traffic
- Staff will return with additional recommendations as mitigation projects are determined

Ongoing in-lieu property taxes minimal; will be reassessed in 5 years

Ongoing in-lieu TOT if hotel or vacation rentals developed on site



Board Inquiry Requests Tab 5

 Staff recorded nearly 140 BIRs during the Spring Budget Workshops in April

- Approximately 70 are answered in the Binder materials
- Remainder will be posted to the CAO's website by October 31, 2021
